



There was – There were. Affirmative, negative and interrogative form

Afirmative form	Negative form	Interrogative form
We use <i>there + was</i> when we talk about singular nouns.	We use <i>there + was + not</i> when we talk about singular nouns.	We use <i>was + there + a/any</i> when we talk about singular nouns.
<i>There was</i> a bank downtown.	<i>There was not</i> a bank downtown.	<i>Was there</i> a bank downtown?
	Contraction: <i>There wasn't</i> a bank downtown	Short answer: Yes, there was. or No, <i>there wasn't</i> .
We use <i>there + were</i> when we talk about plural nouns.	We use <i>there + were + not</i> when we talk about plural nouns.	We use <i>were + there + any</i> when we talk about plural nouns.
<i>There were</i> three parks downtown.	<i>There were not</i> three parks downtown.	<i>Were there</i> any parks downtown?
	Contraction: <i>There weren't</i> three parks downtown.	Short answer: Yes, there were. or No, <i>there weren't</i>
