Afirmative form	Negative form	Interrogative form
<p>Regular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>subject + a regular verb-ed</i> to talk about an action or event in the past.</p>	<p>Regular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>subject + auxiliar did + not + a regular verb</i> to talk about a negative action or event in the past.</p>	<p>Regular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>auxiliar did + subject + regular verb</i> to ask about an action or event in the past.</p>
<p>I cooked dinner yesterday.</p>	<p>I <i>did not</i> cook dinner yesterday.</p> <p>Contraction:</p> <p>I <i>didn't</i> cook dinner yesterday.</p>	<p><i>Did you</i> cook dinner yesterday?</p> <p>Short answers:</p> <p>Yes, I did. / No, I <i>didn't</i>.</p>
<p>Irregular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>subject + an irregular verb</i> in its past form to talk about an action or event in the past.</p>	<p>Irregular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>subject + auxiliar did + not + an irregular verb</i> to talk about an action or event in the past.</p>	<p>Irregular verbs</p> <p>We use <i>auxiliar did + subject + an irregular verb</i> to ask about an action or event in the past.</p>
<p>I ate pizza yesterday.</p>	<p>I <i>did not</i> eat pizza yesterday.</p> <p>Contraction:</p> <p>I <i>didn't</i> eat pizza yesterday.</p> <p>*Notice in both cases, for regular and irregular verbs, <b>YOU DON'T HAVE TO CHANGE THE VERB.</b> In other words, the verb is used in its <b>SIMPLE FORM.</b></p>	<p><i>Did you</i> eat pizza yesterday?</p> <p>Short answers:</p> <p>Yes, I did. / No, I <i>didn't</i>.</p> <p>Notice in both cases, for regular and irregular verbs, <b>YOU DON'T HAVE TO CHANGE THE VERB.</b> In other words, the verb is used in its <b>SIMPLE FORM.</b></p>
