We use auxiliar <i>did</i> + <i>subject</i> + <i>an irregular verb</i> to ask about an action or event in the past.
l ate pizza yesterday.	I <i>did not</i> eat pizza yesterday. Contraction:	<i>Did you</i> eat pizza yesterday? Short answers:
